What did you do before you started your apprenticeship with Tyne North Training?

Before I started my apprenticeship, I decided to study Engineering and Computing at Kenton High 6th form to give me a better idea of what career I wanted. Within my 2 years of studying engineering we covered all aspects of engineering for 6 weeks blocks (practical and written). This gave me an insight into the type of engineering route I wanted to go down. As well as studying at 6th form I was working part time at my local McDonalds which helped me to earn money and pay for holidays and my car.

Tell us what your typical day on your apprenticeship programme with Tyne North Training is like...

My typical day on my apprenticeship program is getting up at 6:30am and travelling to my place of work to start at 7:30am. Throughout the day you can be working alongside a tradesman where he will be passing down his knowledge to you or giving you a good understanding of the task ahead. Where you will be helping measuring, cutting, prepping and setting up Pipework as well as tacking the pipes together. When competent you can be given a drawing where you are by yourself, testing your skills in the industry and completing the task ahead. Finish work 4pm and travel home.

What made you opt for an apprenticeship? And what made you choose Tyne North Training?

During 6th form, I did read a number of apprenticeship brochures and heard from our apprenticeship lecturer talking about opportunities you can achieve throughout a 4-year apprenticeship. These discussions taught me that you should opt for an apprenticeship which would provide me with workplace skills, an opportunity to climb the career ladder, complete NVQs and maybe even a Degree whilst earning money, gaining experience and being an asset to my employer. So, I decided that an apprenticeship would be best route for me in the long run.

I heard about Tyne North Training from a friend, who was already 2 years into his apprenticeship programme with TNT. He spoke very highly of the training center facilities, the teaching from the staff (practical and written) and the training officers being there for you if you needed anything.
